Strengths:

- There are 44 students who have taken Hindi as their first language
- Being non-native speakers, the students from this rural background learning Hindi shows a growing sign of interest in the national language.
- Our library has nearly thousand books in Hindi. A library containing this number of Hindi books is rare in this vicinity.

Weaknesses:

- Being the first generation learners of Hindi, the students have a very limited access to clarify their doubts while learning.
- Students are not aware of the benefits of learning Hindi. They think learning Hindi is unnecessary and risky.

Opportunities:

- Students have passed the examinations conducted by **Central Hindi Directorate**.



- ii. Passing the exams lead them to a higher level of employment opportunities.
- iii. Hindi, being the national language enhances the personality of the learners. Knowing Hindi boosts up the confidence level of the students and it is very helpful for them especially when they go to northern parts of India.

Challenges:

- i. Teaching of the examination results, students hesitate to take Hindi as their first language.
- ii. It becomes a real challenge for the teacher to remove the hesitation of the students.
- iii. Motivating level is very high.
